Welcome to fifth grade! My name is Beth Lewandowsky and I am privileged to be your child's teacher this year. This is my thirteenth year of teaching at Valley Academy, and teaching here has been one of the most rewarding things, I have ever done.

I have been involved in Valley since 2003 when my oldest daughter entered the third grade. She was then followed by her three sisters who have all promoted from Valley and have all moved on to other learning institutes. Please be aware that we will be discussing the grade level and school handbooks, placing emphasis on certain sections. We will be discussing attendance, including absence and tardy procedures. School-wide and classroom rules will also be discussed thoroughly. Consequences for choosing to disobey these rules were also highlighted. Another very important discussion centered on the school dress code. Students should now be aware of proper dress to insure compliance with the Elementary Dress Standards, as set forth in the school handbook. Our homework and late work policies were discussed at length to insure that no misunderstandings should arise.

This year fifth grade is transitioning to the use of behavior cards, similar to what our sixth through eighth grades use. These are designed to track both behavior and homework completion. Please watch for more information on this to come home during the first week of school.

Parent/teacher communication is very important. If you need to get a message to me during the school day, please dial the school's main phone number, 623-516-7747, extension 522. I will not be available to speak to you directly, but I will check my messages throughout the day. Emergency messages should be directed through the front office. You will also be receiving a weekly letter from me, Lewandowsky Letter, each weekend via email, and a hard copy sent home in the weekly folder on Monday. This letter will highlight assignments and test for the week.

Thank you for affording me this opportunity to share this school year with your family. We will work hard this year, but we will have fun, too!
